Background

- Job is the first of five "_____" books. These books are the heart of the Old Testament.
- The book of Job is unique in several ways: It is set in the land of "Uz," far from Israel. The key characters are not from Israel. There is no clear historical setting.
- The human penman is unknown. Many scholars believe that Job lived during the time of Abraham. If Job penned it, it is the oldest book in the Bible.
- The theme of *theodicy* dominates the book. How do we reconcile undeserved suffering with a God who is all-powerful and just?

The theme of Job is "_____God's Wisdom in Suffering." Pain presents problems that are not easily solved. Suffering is an invitation to trust God when we cannot understand Him.

- Like the Lord Jesus, Job was an innocent sufferer who retained His integrity (2:9), hoped in a resurrection (19:25-26), and prayed for his enemies (42:10).
- The Lord Jesus is the Daysman (or mediator) that stands between God and men (9:33) (1 Tim. 2:5).
